This 3 day workshop provides practical skills and knowledge for anthropology students and recent graduates interested to pursue a career in native title.

Leading anthropologist, Kingsley Palmer, will be joined by members of native title groups, native title anthropologists and lawyers to deliver sessions on essential skills and knowledge required for NTRB anthropology work.

Workshop topics

- field work methods including interview techniques and tips for recording your research
- archival research practices
- understanding kinship and gathering genealogies
- ethical considerations and practices in applied anthropology
- the evidentiary requirements of the Native Title Act 1993 and how these requirements have changed over time
- key debates that have been generated through the native title claim process, such as systems of connection to country and definitions of societies
- information about Native Title Representative Bodies (NTRBs), their functions under the Native Title Act 1993 (NTA) and the roles of different staff groups
- case studies to demonstrate practical aspects of native title claim research.

The workshop location will be advised by October 2014.

Eligibility and registrations

Aurora anthropology interns will be invited to register for the workshop when confirmed as eligible to be placed in the summer 2014/15 round. Priority will be given to anthropology interns with a confirmed placement at an NTRB and anthropologists recently employed at an NTRB. Students and recent graduates in anthropology wishing to work in NTRBs are welcome to apply and will be able to attend if space permits.

Travel assistance

Participants travelling from out of town who are not employed in native title will be eligible to apply for travel assistance when registering for the workshop.
